

The Mishneh Torah, written by Rambam, is one of the foundational works of Jewish Law. All texts will be provided in Hebrew and English. This class does not require regular attendance, so please join us any time!

Parashat HaShavua

In this class we will engage in an in-depth study of selected verses from the weekly Torah reading. This year we will be studying the Torah through the lens of Midrash Rabbah, the classic rabbinic collection of homiletical interpretations of the Torah. All texts will be provided in Hebrew and English. This class does not require regular attendance, so please join us any Shabbat morning!

Talmud Study

Please join us each week as we study the Talmud, the foundation collection of rabbinic law and lore. We begin each session studying the text with a partner, and then engage in a larger group discussion. This class is suitable for students of all levels and all texts are available in English. New students are welcome at any time.

Jewish Theology and the Modern Jew

In this class we will grapple with some of the major theological issues confronting Jews today. Using Rabbi Neil Gillman's book <u>Sacred Fragments: Recovering Theology for the Modern Jew</u> as the basis of our discussion, we will consider a variety of approaches, including our own, to such fundamental questions as: What and how can we know about God? What is the basis for religious authority today? Ritual: Why do We Need It? and The End of Days: What Will Be? In this experimental prayer service, modeled on Kehillat Shira Hadasha in Jerusalem, the minyan will be comprised of ten men <u>and</u> ten women, allowing both men and women to count equally towards the minyan. Please be aware that no exceptions will be made and those parts of the service requiring a minyan will not be recited unless we have ten men and ten women. This minyan will meet every Monday evening for Ma'ariv over the course of eight weeks. Ma'ariv begins with Barechu, which requires a minyan, so please arrive promptly.

The Torah commands us to recite the Shema every morning and every evening, but it does not tell us why. In this class we will explore the history, structure and theology of the Shema in order to better understand the purpose of this commandment. **Registration required.**

Refining Our Middot Through Study and Mindfulness Practices

Each session will explore texts and mindfulness tools related to the specific middah being studied. In this class, we will analyze the media's historical treatment of the Jews, Israel and a wide range of important Jewish issues. In so doing, we will study both conventional, and non-conventional, methods of mass communication and learn how the medium can affect the message. We will attempt to distinguish between unpopular or unfair reporting and biased, even anti-Semitic, rhetoric. We will conclude by addressing the challenges posed by the hateful communication disseminated through the internet and social media. There will be some light reading required, but all you have to bring is an opinion and a willingness to share it.

Scholars-in-Residence

Rabbi Reuven Hammer

A founder of the Masorti Movement in Israel, Rabbi Reuven Hammer is a highly respected scholar, author and lecturer who was once listed among the fifty most influential Jews in America. He holds a Doctorate in Theology and Rabbinical Ordination from the Jewish Theological Seminary and is the author the Conservative Movement's official commentary on the prayer book, <u>Or Hadash</u>. He is also the author of two books, <u>Sifre: A Taanaitic commentary on the Book of Deuteronomy</u> and <u>Entering the High Holy Days: A Guide to Origins, Themes, and Prayers</u>, which were both awarded the prestigious National Jewish Book Award. His new book is <u>Akiva:</u> <u>Life, Legend, Legacy</u>, an exploration of the legendary Rabbi Akiva.

Rabbi Daniel Greyber

A gold medalist and Captain of the U.S. Swimming Team at the 1993 World Maccabiah Games, Rabbi Greyber holds a Masters in Speech and Communications Studies from Northwestern University and was ordained in 2002 at the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies of American Jewish University. Upon rabbinic ordination in 2002, Rabbi Greyber served as the Executive Director of Camp Ramah in California for nearly a decade. During that time Rabbi Greyber also served as an adjunct faculty member of the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies. He currently serves as the rabbi of Beth El Synagogue in Durham, North Carolina. Rabbi Greyber is a prolific author whose latest book is <u>Faith Unravels: A Rabbi's Struggle With Grief and God</u>.

Rabbi Ethan Tucker

Rabbi Ethan Tucker is President and Rosh Yeshiva at Mechon Hadar and chair in Jewish Law. Ethan also directs Mechon Hadar's Center for Jewish Law and Values. Previously, Ethan was a faculty member at the Drisha Institute for Jewish Education, where he taught Talmud and Halakhah in the Scholars' Circle. Ethan was ordained by the Chief Rabbinate of Israel and earned a doctorate in Talmud and Rabbinics from the Jewish Theological Seminary and a B.A. from Harvard College. He has been named multiple times to Newsweek's list of the top 50 rabbis in America. A Wexner Graduate Fellow, he was a co-founder of Kehilat Hadar and a winner of the first Grinspoon Foundation Social Entrepreneur Fellowship.
